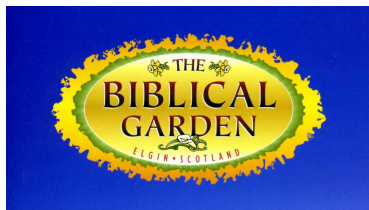

On a recent visit to Elgin library in Morayshire, I picked up a leaflet about **The Biblical Garden**, which seems to be unique in Scotland. I didn't have time to visit it but hope to do so next year.

It is located on a 3acre site in Cooper Park, close to the ruins of Elgin cathedral and has been open for the past 12 years.

There is an impressive central walkway laid out in the shape of a Celtic Cross and the garden is planted round this cross with all of the 110 plants mentioned in the Bible. The plants are all cross-referenced to a particular passage in scripture. The garden is walled on all sides thus offering an atmosphere of peaceful seclusion.

There are also life-size sculptures depicting parables and stories from the Bible including Samson in the Temple, the Good Shepherd, the Prodigal Son and the Sower.

Features of the Garden also include a desert area to represent Mount Sinai, The Cave of the Resurrection and "A floral rainbow", displaying a wonderful show of colourful flowers.

It sounds as if this might be an interesting place to visit, so add it to your "must see" list of places to visit in Scotland. The garden is open from May to September between the hours of 10.00am and 7.30pm daily, and admission is free.
